You'll connect with fellow participants from many nations, as well as UW-Madison students. Running **July 10-30, 2016**, it's an authentic American adventure in the heart of the Midwest.

Instructors in the **American Culture and English Program** are well qualified and have extensive experience working with international students.

In the morning, you'll take classes in English language for three and a half hours. In the Communication class you'll improve your speaking and listening, while the Writing and Grammar class will help you improve your understanding of the structure of English. In Special Classes and Workshops, you'll use English to learn about university programs and other interesting topics. The atmosphere is fun and casual, and the content will relate to the activities and field trips you'll enjoy after class.

Engaging Activities

Madison combines the tranquility of a midsized city with the cultural opportunities of a major metropolitan center. Stroll along State Street, a popular spot for restaurants and shopping. Sample the wares at one of the country's top farmers' markets, located on the bustling Capitol Square. Explore the University of Wisconsin–Madison's 1,200-acre Arboretum. Enjoy music and water sports at the university's charming lakeside terrace. Visit the Henry Vilas Zoo and Olbrich Botanical Gardens. Run, hike, or bike along the extensive network of trails, or play a variety of sports at the university's facilities. If you'd just like to relax, you can visit one of the UW-Madison's student unions, which offer billiards, games, bowling, large-screen TVs, climbing walls, concerts, movies, lectures, and more.

And that's just Madison itself. The American Culture and English Program includes day trips to one of Wisconsin's 49 state parks; to the nearby city of Chicago, featuring a boat tour and a visit to the Shedd Aquarium; and to the Wisconsin Dells, home of America's largest water park.

\$3,995 includes a double room, classes, all meals, and activities. A \$500 nonrefundable deposit (that will be credited towards the total cost) is due at the time of registration. The remaining balance of \$3,495 is due on June 10, 2016.

Registration

The last day to register is March 18, 2016. Register online at go.wisc.edu/ace. Participants must be at least 14 years old (born before July 7, 2002) and no older than 18. At least a basic knowledge of English is required for this program. Our free online test at go.wisc.edu/ ace can help you determine your language level.
